Community Terms of Reference

The OCUL Resource Sharing Community brings together OCUL members who have roles in supporting resource sharing (interlibrary loan) activity within OCUL as well as in the national and global context.

The Community will work together to promote resource sharing services in academic libraries by formulating policies and procedures, by advancing and supporting emerging trends (e.g. interlibrary loan of e-material) and by addressing relevant copyright, licensing and delivery issues.

Established in 2013 this Community is a consolidation of the existing OCUL VDX users group, which was created with the introduction of RACER (Rapid Access to Collections by Electronic Requesting) in 2003 and of the earlier OCUL ILL group. As resource sharing activities are integral to the OCUL mission, this is envisioned as an ongoing Community.
